****REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETING****

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**\*\*NOTE:** The April 27th, 2020 meeting of the Medina City Council was conducted as a remote meeting, pursuant to H.B. #197.

President Coyne stated that after listening to the Governor of Ohio today, it looks like council will be able to meet again at city hall for the May 11<sup>th</sup> meetings, but will be under different protocols. We will still be practicing social distancing but are not mandated to wear masks.

Mr. Coyne stated that council will be taking a conservative approach to budgets this year to keep an eye on income tax collections.

**Call to Order:**

Medina City Council met in remote session on Monday, April 27th, 2020. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by President of Council John Coyne who led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

President Coyne explained they are trying something new due to the Coronavirus pandemic and are asking members to communicate with them via Facebook or email for questions you may have rather than attend the meetings for your safety and ours.

**Roll Call:**

**Reports of Municipal Officers:**

**Dennis Hanwell, Mayor,**

- A. Covid-19 - City Hall will have limited access effective immediately. Appointments will be required to meet with staff. Any items that may be submitted electronically or mailed are preferred. We will have a box or bin in vestibules at both entrances to leave mail for any city department. We will distribute. Also have utility drops at Medina Municipal Court lot. If emergency and access needed without an appointment, numbers will be posted at inner city hall doors to call office and ask for immediate help. Essential services to constituents will be maintained, but some services deferred- For example, fence permits, pool permits, etc. to limit exposure of public to staff and vice versa. We apologize for any inconvenience, but want to keep all safe and stop the spread of the virus. Thank Medina City Schools for sharing laptops during their closure with city to permit operations from home for some staff members. Videos on city website, [www.medinaoh.org](http://www.medinaoh.org) for businesses and residents on local recommendations during COVID-19 pandemic. May 1 all staff and visitors must wear masks or no entry.
- B. New Parking Deck/TIF- The new parking deck being erected was supplemented by a \$1m capital grant from the State of Ohio due to historical downtown and numerous events and activities that draw visitors from a broad region. The deck costs about \$3.8m, so the city is loaning or fronting the remaining \$2.8m. The city established a Tax Increment Finance District for areas adjacent and surrounding the parking deck. Upper floor of parking deck is scheduled to be poured with concrete in next few weeks. Project will last until near end of June.

- C. Tornado-** Strong storm and winds caused extreme damage in city to numerous homes and businesses. Still cleaning up debris. 45 locations moderately to severely damaged - 35 houses, 2 industrial, 2 warehouses and 6 commercial.
- D. S. Broadway-** between Grant and Lafayette Rd. closed for reconstruction- partially grant funded.
- E. Center Block Crosswalks** - out to bid for Medina Square center block crosswalks. Flashing lights to make crossing safer, funded by grant monies. \$106k total, \$70,666 capital grant and \$35,334 local funds – SAFETY.
- F. Proclamation- Kathy Patton** - Mayor turned it over to Mr. Coyne for a proclamation that they jointly signed.  
Mr. Coyne stated this is a proclamation from the City of Medina and for the 51<sup>st</sup> anniversary of Municipal Clerk’s Week to honor Kathy Patton.

Reminded the public that the income tax deadline has been pushed back to July 15<sup>th</sup> to match with the state and federal.

**Unfinished Business:**

**Introduction of Visitors:**

**Mr. Justin Eddy** stated he is present to represent his client Trillium Creek LLC, to rezone the

property at 1088 S. Court St. from an R-3 classification to C-S zoning classification. Plan of action with this property is to improve it with an ATM kiosk branded by Key Bank. Additional improvements would be to install a 36 ft. concrete apron on S. Court St. southern boundary of property with a circular access drive. Their intent is to bring zoning for this property into conformance with the character of the surrounding area.

Mr. Eddy stated as this relates to C-S zoning, this is an ideal location for the uses that are associated with that zoning classification, which is essentially limited business service activities.

Mr. Eddy brought up the residents of Pinewood and their concerns with traffic stating he understands and takes their concerns seriously and he feels traffic control in this corridor is a problem that is beyond the scope of what they are considering here tonight. In this case this is a lawful use and Ohio case law states traffic is essentially a secondary consideration. It is designed to capture existing traffic flows. In conclusion he would request that council approve the rezoning of the property to the C-S zoning.

**Patricia Ryan** resides at 4254 Sharon Copley Road, Medina, OH 44256. Ms. Ryan's comments were read into the record by Ward 4 Councilman Jim Shields. Over the last year the Pinewood Condominium residents and others have provided sound justification for our objections to rezoning 1088 S. Court St. I have these final comments for your consideration regarding the issue:

A rezoning should never be decided on a "proposed" use. These proposals can vanish immediately after zoning is modified. This rezoning includes the 2 existing occupied buildings. You must consider the possibility of the owner establishing multiple businesses on this property.

By definition Office and Personal and Professional Services allows for multiple high traffic uses such as a medical, dental office, salon, health club, day spa, fitness facility and more. This is one of our main objections – traffic and safety. Please review any and all potential uses that this district allows whether permitted, conditionally permitted or possibly considered a similar use by the Planning Commission.

The current City of Medina Comprehensive Plan is the only one in effect and should be followed until officially amended.

Good planning looks to the future please don't be shortsighted. Many travel within and into the City to work, shop at the local businesses, dine at local restaurants, and enjoy the wonderful events the City sponsors. The future of this hinges on your decision. It is your civic responsibility to protect the community – do that now by denying this rezoning.

**Pinewood Condominium Association Comments read by Ward 4 Councilman Jim Shields**

In the past year you have heard the many reasons we oppose rezoning the lot at 1088 S. Court St. to any commercial zoning. Even this most restrictive commercial zoning would permit uses that would negatively impact our residential property. The main focus of our opposition relates to traffic and safety issues. The C-S zoning permits uses that will add another driveway and more traffic congestion to the area. Pinewood residents and visitors experience traffic and safety issues daily as we enter and exit our development onto S. Court St. We wish we could avoid S. Court,

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but we have no choice since we have no other access route.

We are anxious to have ODOT conduct the traffic study requested by Mayor Hanwell and County Officials. We believe it will validate the reasons for our opposition and lead to changes in traffic management that will ensure public safety on S. Court St.

We still do not know why the City Attorney asked you to approve this rezoning request. But we urge you seriously consider all the arguments we have presented. Do not vote just to avoid litigation or limit the City's liability.

You have received emails from our residents, their relatives, and visitors expressing their opposition to the rezoning. We hope you have read them and given them careful consideration. These are the citizens, taxpayers, and voters of Medina that elected you to represent their interests and ensure their general welfare. Show them your commitment and concern for their safety and welfare. Do the right thing. Vote to deny this rezoning request.

Ms. Walker's comments were read into the record by President of Council, John Coyne.

Rezoning Request for 1088 S. Court St. to C-S Zoning  
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During the Medina City Council meeting on April 13th the City mischaracterized the goal of the Save Your Courthouse Committee. The goal of the Committee and its Initiative Petition is to allow the taxpayers to vote on the Courthouse Project.

During the April 13th Council meeting the City stated that even if the Initiative Petition is successful, the County will go forward and tear down the white-columned 1969 Courthouse. The City and County are not taking into account that the County is unlikely to be able to afford the Courthouse Project without the \$8 million contribution of the City, especially now in these rough economic times. The sales taxes and other income of the County are going to be less than earlier predicted. Other counties are already laying off people and are not going into debt for large construction projects.

**Alfred J Connors** resides at: 26 Pinewood Dr., Medina, OH 44256  
He is a resident of Pinewood Condominiums and here are his concerns: I am requesting a no vote on the re zoning of 1080 S Court St.

Since the drive would be at the top of a hill, which obstructs the vision of oncoming traffic it would make for a very dangerous situation. This danger has already been recognized by Mayor / Safety Director Hanwell who noted as a corridor "provides significant safety concerns for the motoring public as well as our safety forces" Due to its limited lanes and numerous business driveways.

This is all as it exists now, once all the new construction between Pinewood and route 162 is complete and the countless houses and condos occupied the current situation will be magnified 5 fold.

Council must act to protect the citizens of Medina generally and in this case, those of Pinewood in particular. Please vote against the rezoning. Thank You.

**An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor to advertise for competitive bids and to award a contract to the successful bidder for the 2020-2021 Equipment and Asphalt General Paving Services Program.** Mr. Shields moved for the adoption of Ordinance/Resolution No. 075-20, seconded by Mr. Simpson. Mr. Piccoli stated this is their annual asphalt paving program, the City has been served well over the last 8 years using this program. It is used for city streets, parking lots and some of the roadways at the parks. The roll was called and Ordinance/Resolution No. 075-20 passed by the yea votes of J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, B. Lamb, P. Rose, J. Shields, D. Simpson, and J. Coyne.

Mr. Patton stated the City received a grant from the Ohio Publics Work Commission for the replacement of these two bridges and after a qualification based selection process they determined Cunningham & Associates to be the most qualified for this project. Mr. Patton stated this is a follow up, they previously awarded the design agreement to Delta for the airport remarking. This task order #4 will be for the construction, administration and inspection. The City is only responsible for 10% as the grant will cover the other 90%. The roll was called and Ordinance/Resolution No. 077-20 passed by the yea votes of B. Lamb, P. Rose, J. Shields, D. Simpson, J. Coyne, J. Hazeltine, and E. Heffinger.

**A Resolution accepting the 2020 Remote Technology Grant Project Award from the Supreme Court of Ohio to the Medina Municipal Court, and Declaring an Emergency.** Mr. Shields moved for the adoption of Ordinance/Resolution No. 078-20, seconded by Mr. Simpson. Mr. Shields moved that the emergency clause be added to Ordinance/Resolution No. 078-20, seconded by Mr. Simpson. Mr. Coyne stated at the Finance meeting today the bailiff spoke on this regarding receiving a grant that assists the bailiff department in some remote technology of communicating with people on probation. This will enable them to communicate on cell phones or computers and have less people come in through the court facility for these required visits which is important at this time of the pandemic. Emergency is requested because the grant is due soon. The roll was called on adding the emergency clause and was approved by the yea votes of D. Simpson, J. Coyne, J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, B. Lamb, P. Rose, and J. Shields. The roll was called and Ordinance/Resolution No. 078-20 passed by the yea votes of P. Rose, J. Shields, D. Simpson, J. Coyne, J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, and B. Lamb.

**Ord. 079-20:**

**An Ordinance Ratifying the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the City of Medina and The Ohio Patrolmen's Benevolent Association for the Police Sergeants and Authorizing the Mayor to Execute said Agreement, and Declaring an Emergency.** Mr. Shields moved for the adoption of Ordinance/Resolution No. 079-20, seconded by Mr. Simpson. Mr. Shields moved that the emergency clause be added to Ordinance/Resolution No. 079-20, seconded by Mr. Simpson. Mayor Hanwell stated he will address all three ordinances together. Wages for all three contracts were 2.5% in 2020 retroactive back to the first of the year. 2.5% in 2021, 2.75 in 2022. Shift differential for each was raised from .35 per hour to .50 per hour. Patrol Officer's contract the officer gets a 5% stipend to the officer in charge for working 2 hours or greater. If someone is called in on a holiday they will get double time for an unscheduled holiday. The educational benefit all three contracts awarded college degrees and military serving 3 or more years with honorable discharged gets same benefit. Hospitalization with those that take participation in the wellness program get a 4% reduction paying 12%, the nonparticipants will go from 16% to 20%. If our healthcare premiums increase by 1% or more in either of the contract in 2021 and 2022 then the employee share will go to 14% for those participating in wellness. Emergency is needed due to pension payments and back pay. Mr. Simpson will abstain from voting due to being related to a sergeant on the Police department. The roll was called on adding the emergency clause and was approved by the yea votes of P. Rose, J. Shields, J. Coyne, J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, and B. Lamb. D. Simpson abstained. The roll was called and Ordinance/Resolution No. 079-20 passed by the yea votes of J. Coyne, J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, B. Lamb, P. Rose, and J. Shields. D. Simpson abstained.

**Ord. 083-20: (Failed 2-5)**

**An Ordinance Rezoning the Property at 1088 S. Court Street from R-3, High Density Residential to C-S, Commercial Service.** Mr. Shields moved for the adoption of Ordinance/Resolution No. 083-20, seconded by Mr. Simpson. Mr. Rose stated he had no more new information from the Planning Commission other than relaying the history of the several attempts the applicant has had in trying to rezone this property. The general consensus was the CS zoning was the most restrictive that could be used on this property. In regards to the traffic, it is already there and will not be adding to the traffic as cars come in to use the ATM. Lastly, the access and exit to the ATM was suggested to be a right turn only.

Mr. Simpson has read every email that has come through Council from the residents and sympathizes with their concerns over traffic and hopes that the State will eventually do a traffic study. Denny stated when they turned down the first request for rezoning there was talk about litigation and he realizes that we as Council should not be looking at a fear of being sued as a reason for voting yes or no on an issue, even though it is a minor part of his decision but it is something that he looks at.

Mr. Lamb stated the C-S zoning is not the most restrictive zoning for this property, the most restrictive zoning is what it is zoned now. This rezoning has come before the city 3 times now and all three times the residents have spoken stating that they do not want the rezoning and have cited reasonable, responsible, well thought out concerns. The biggest investments people make are in their residences. Mr. Lamb stated he lives on South Court Street and feels it is a misrepresentation of that area to continually say it is a commercial corridor. Property by property the vast majority of South Court in the city is residential, there is a spot of commercial development just at the edge of town and into the township. The residents have given us a list of arguments of why this rezoning is not good for them. Bill stated they have a responsibility to these people to do what is right and not do what we think we have to do because of litigation. Mr. Lamb expressed that he will vote no.

Mr. Shields stated that this is in his ward and has been dealing with it now for over 18 months and appreciates everybody that has been involved. Mr. Eddy and he have tried to reach a compromise by sitting down with Trillium Creek and the residents discussing another entrance or combining entrances but in the end they were unable to do it by the way the property is situated right on the border. He represents the residents of that area and he will be voting no.

Mr. Coyne asked Mr. Huber stating it is his understanding that in this case that since the Planning Commission recommended for the rezoning in order for this to pass council a majority four of the seven of council members have to vote for it, Mr. Huber responded correct.

The roll was called and Ordinance/Resolution No. 083-20 FAILED by the nay votes of J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, B. Lamb, P. Rose, and J. Shields. J. Coyne, D. Simpson voted yea.

**Ord. 084-20:**

**An Ordinance amending Ordinance No. 187-19, passed November 25, 2019. (Amendments to 2020 Budget)** Mr. Shields moved for the adoption of Ordinance/Resolution No. 084-20, seconded by Mr. Simpson. Mr. Dirham stated this is to appropriate funds that have been donated for construction of a restroom facility at Sam Masi Park. The roll was called and Ordinance/Resolution No. 084-20 passed by the yea votes of J. Coyne, J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, B. Lamb, P. Rose, J. Shields, and D. Simpson.

**To be added to the agenda if approved by Finance Committee:**

Mr. Shields moved to add Ord. 085-20 to the agenda, seconded by Mr. Simpson. The roll was called on adding Ord. 085-20 to the agenda and passed by the yea votes of J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, B. Lamb, P. Rose, J. Shields, D. Simpson, and J. Coyne.

**Ord. 085-20:**

**An Ordinance authorizing the expenditure of \$2,500 to Cups Café for COVID-19 relief to City of Medina residents.** Mr. Shields moved for the adoption of Ordinance/Resolution No. 085-20, seconded by Mr. Simpson. Mr. Shields moved that the emergency clause be added to Ordinance/Resolution No. 085-20 subject to final approval of the Law Director's language, seconded by Mr. Simpson. The roll was called on adding the emergency clause and was approved by the yea votes of B. Lamb, P. Rose, J. Shields, D. Simpson, J. Coyne, J. Hazeltine, and E.

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Heffinger. The roll was called and Ordinance/Resolution No. 085-20 passed by the yeas votes of J. Hazeltine, E. Heffinger, B. Lamb, P. Rose, J. Shields, D. Simpson, and J. Coyne.

**Council Comments:**

Mr. Simpson publically thanked Bill and Jessica for introducing this legislation for a donation of \$2,500.00 to Cups Café. He added he hopes everyone is staying safe out there.

Mr. Lamb stated he found a t-shirt for Mr. Simpson that says "Be Kind". He thanked Mrs. Hazeltine for being the engine in caring for the community and getting this donation to Cups Café.

Mr. Heffinger thanked the Stevenson Foundation and the Miracle League for their donations in making sure that restroom is a possibility at Sam Masi Park. Eric also thanked Mrs. Hazeltine for all her work. Anyone that can donate please donate to Cups.

Mrs. Hazeltine thanked Council for their help and support on Ord. 085-20.

Mr. Coyne wanted to give recognition to all the first responders at this time, they take a very high risk just doing their jobs. We appreciate them. I also want to pray for those families that have lost a loved one during this pandemic especially in Medina County.

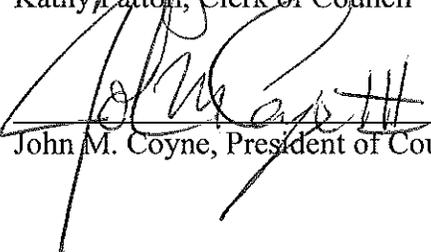
